


GREATER DANDENONG YOUTH NETWORK – MEETING MINUTES

	Professor Kate Fitz-Gibbon (Director Monash gender and Family Violence Prevention Centre)
	Kate was to provide insight into the nature and drivers of AVITH, detail the support needed and provide an outline
	of the national study being undertaken by Monash University to further explore AVITH.
	A representative of Eastern Access Community Health (EACH) had been engaged to present on their Pathways to Resilience program – an AVITH therapeutic program that offers tailored service delivery to families.
Karalyn Davies (Senior Project Officer at the Centre for Excellence in Child and Family Welfare)	Karalyn presented an overview of the 'Building the Evidence' AVITH project, which includes the community of practice, contributing to the adolescent MARAM framework draft, as well as developing other practice leadership resources.
	In Professor Kate Fitz-Gibbon's absence, Karalyn presented a brief overview of the drivers of AVITH and how they manifest. In Australia, we don't yet have a shared understanding of the causes and drivers of AVITH. This means that programs currently being implemented throughout Victoria and Australia operate according to different theories of change, and therefore have vastly different approaches.







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	Karalyn spoke of the establishment of the AVITH Community of Practice - which brings together new and existing AVITH providers to strengthen practice through collaboration, discuss key themes and keep up to date with the work being done in this space. <u>https://www.outcomes.org.au/adolescents-who-use-violence-in-the-home-avith/avith-community-of-practice/</u>

Andy Young (Service System Navigator at The Orange Door)	Andy provided the network with a comprehensive overview of The Orange Door (TOD) and shared insights into how they respond to adolescent family violence as a frontline family violence service.		
	Background Context Appointment of TOD came from the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Family Violence (recommendations 37 and 38) to establish a network of Support and Safety Hubs across Victoria.		



 What The Orange Door does The Orange Door is an intake service model that offers individuals and families in need of support with an entry point to access the range of services they may require from across the specialist family violence, men's family violence (people who use violence), child FIRST, Child Protection, and Aboriginal family violence service supports. The Orange Door service model provides women, children, and families with: a single and coordinated entry point to access the service supports they need a more integrated approach to initial screening, risk assessment and planning that helps to ensure they get the right help at the right time specialist support and tailored advice for victims, families, children, and people who use violence a more visible contact point so that people know where to go for support
 Key Premise The key premise of TOD is the provision of the right service at the right time, supporting the broader, connected service system to: improve the safety of adults, children and young people who experience, or are at risk of, family violence support children and young people (and their families) with their care, wellbeing, and development A shift in responsibility from the individual experiencing family violence to the system, to intervene early and keep people who use violence in view and accountable A person-centred approach which supports individuals within families and is inclusive of diversity and complex needs
